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that section. They conducted this hazardous occupation very successfully, having a record of shooting sixteen wells in one day. In August, 1877, after his father's death, he became manager of the latter's oil properties at Pleasantville and Warren county, locating his residence in Bradford. He then became actively engaged in oil production, with W. B. Roberts, of Titusville, as partner, leasing oil lands at Four Mile, New York, and Chamberlain Hollow near Dallas City, McKean county, Pennsylvania, and making outright purchase of other land. In 1881 he became a member of the Bradford Oil Exchange and for ten years was broker and dealer on the exchange. In 1891 he became a business associate of the owner of the Bradford *Evening Record*, continuing until 1909, when he withdrew from active business life after a very successful career. He served eleven years in Company C, Sixteenth Regiment Pennsylvania National Guard, organized in 1880, retiring with the rank of sergeant. He is a thorough independent in political action, and while liberal in religious thought is a member, with his wife, of the Presbyterian church, and while in Cleveland attended the Sunday school of which John D. Rockefeller was superintendent.

He married, March 20, 1890, Nellie Belle Arters, born in Tidioute, Pennsylvania, October 28, 1861, daughter of George Washington Arters (see Arters II). Children of Edward J. and Nellie B. (II) George Washington, son of Thomas Arters, was born in Vermont, April 12, 1835, a veteran of the civil war having served three years with the famous Pennsylvania "Bucktail" regiment; he is now living retired at Tidioute. He married Polly Irene Rush, born at Red Bank, Clarion county, Pennsylvania, September 7, 1844, also now living in Tidioute. Children of George W. Arters: 1. Nellie Belle, of previous mention, wife of Edward J. Boylston. 2. Glendora, born June 10, 1873 (twelve years after the birth of her elder sister); married William E. Moss, an employee of the Standard Oil Company. 3. Edward Byron, born 1875; now an upholsterer and dealer in Massilon, Ohio; his wife Blanche bore him a son George in 1907. Polly Irene (Rush) Arters is a daughter of Isaac Rush, who died near Red Bank, Pennsylvania, about 1892, a very old man. He had three wives, his first bearing him ten children: 1. Charlotte, deceased; married ———, no issue. 2. Zelma, died unmarried near Pittsburgh. 3. Fanny, died unmarried near Pittsburgh. 4. Polly Irene, of previous mention. 5. Ira, died near Pittsburgh; married and left a family. 6. Findley, living in Pittsburgh; married and has a family. 7. Mary, married a Mr. Mortimer, a wealthy farmer, now living at Pittsburgh; issue; Laura, married a Mr. Reeves and lives in Indiana, has issue. 9. and 10. Sons living in Ohio.

John Ball, the founder of this family, was admitted freeman of Wattertown, Massachusetts, in 1650, and died there November 1, 1655. So far as is known at present there is no connection between him and the Ball families of Virginia and New Jersey. William Ball was in Virginia prior to 1650, and Edward Ball was one of the founders of Newark, New Jersey, in 1666. There were also other Ball emigrants to New England between 1630 and 1650, but there is nothing to show that there was any connection between them except an unsupported newspaper paragraph published about seventy-five or

eighty years ago. If there is any connection between the various families, and it is not improbable that there is, it must be sought for among the records in England, as a diligent search of the records in this country by many investigators has failed to reveal any evidence of relationship whatever. Children of John Ball of Watertown, Massachusetts (that is those of record, there were probably others): Nathaniel, settled in that part of Concord, which is now a part of Bedford, Massachusetts; John, referred to below.

(II) John (2), son of John (1) Ball, was a tailor in Watertown, Massachusetts. He married (first) Elizabeth, daughter of John and Elizabeth Peirce, of Watertown, and (second) October 3, 1665, Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Fox of Concord. Children, four by first marriage: John (3), referred to below; Mary; Esther; Abigail, died young; Joseph.

(III) John (3), son of John (2) and Elizabeth (Peirce) Ball, was born in Watertown, Massachusetts, and died there, May 8, 1722. He was a weaver. He married, October 17, 1665, Sarah, daughter of George and Beatrice Bullard, of Watertown. Children: 1. Sarah, born July 11, 1666; married, March 13, 1684, Allen Flagg. 2. John, born June 29, 1668, died in Waltham, October 24, 1752; married (first) September 27, 1699, Bethia Mettup, (second) Mary ——. 3. (IV) Joseph, son of John (3) and Sarah (Bullard) Ball, was born in Watertown, Massachusetts, May 4, 1674, died before April 8, 1730, the date of the proving of his will. He married, December 31, 1701, Elizabeth, daughter of John and Abigail (Garfield) Parkhurst, who was born September 18, 1681. Children: Joseph, born October 1, 1702, died January 14, 1781, married, May 6, 1731, Bathsheba Bellows, of Southborough, Massachusetts; Abigail, born March 27, 1705, married, February 26, 1728-29, Jacob Morse, of Framingham; Peter, referred to below; Elizabeth, born March 15,

1710, married, February 3, 1731-32, William Brewer; Josiah, born March 2, 1712-13; Isaac, twin with Josiah, died in April, 1713; David, born January 17, 1716-17, married, July 10, 1735, Sybil Patterson; Patience, born October 12, 1718, married Nathaniel Mills, of Needham; Jonas, died February 10, 1729-30.

(V) Peter, son of Joseph and Elizabeth (Parkhurst) Ball, was born in Watertown, Massachusetts, October 7, 1707. He married (first) May 6, 1730, Rebecca, born in Watertown, February 21, 1709, daughter of Samuel and Rebecca (Stratton) Seaverns. He married (second) September 30, 1732, Abigail, daughter of John and Martha (Lawrence) Dix, who was born July 25, 1710. Children, all by second marriage: Abigail, born June 1, 1734, married, November 22, 1752, Joel Mathis; Jonas, born February 9, 1735-36, married, December 6, 1762, Molly Taylor; Peter, born December 7, 1737; Rebecca, born November 16, 1739, married, September 4, 1759, William Brigham; Samuel, born June 10, 1742, died July 7, 1800; Martha, born February 7, 1744-45, married, December 4, 1766, Benjamin Wellington; Joseph; Silas, born in Southborough, Massachusetts, died June 19, 1786, married, February 1, 1781, Katharine Newton; Jonathan, referred to below.

(VI) Jonathan, son of Peter and Rebecca (Seaverns) Ball, was born in Southborough, Massachusetts, in 1752. He married Anna, daughter of ——— and Anna (Townsend) Gibbs, who was born in old Sudbury, Massachusetts. Children: Jonathan (2), referred to below; Silas; Alonzo S.; Rebecca, died aged twenty years; Polly, married ——— Utleigh of Buffalo, New York; Nancy, married ——— Crossfield, of Keene, New Hampshire; Abigail, married ——— Rogers; Lucinda, married ——— Murray; Nellie, died in infancy.

(VII) Jonathan (2), son of Jonathan (1) and Anna (Gibbs) Ball, was born at Southborough, Massachusetts, August 18, 1783, died in Lowville, Lewis county, New York, January 24, 1833. He married, September 5, 1805, Lucinda, daughter of John (2) and Anna (Dickinson) Ballard (see Dickinson V). Children, all born in Lowville, New York: Caroline Ann, born June 20, 1807, died July 30, 1843, married, October 7, 1828, D. G. Haskins; Alonzo Gibbs, born October 24, 1808, died March 17, 1879, married (first) in 1843, Ardelia Arnold, (second) March 21, 1860, Dolcentra M. Terry; John Ballard, born Septem-

ber 6, 1811, married, April 15, 1836, Melinda Bailey; Silas Dexter, born August 15, 1813, died unmarried; Irene, born January 3, 1816, died November 10, 1845, married, October 1, 1837, Rev. William T. Allen; Archibald McCullum, referred to below.

(VIII) Rev. Archibald McCullum Ball, son of Jonathan (2) and Lucinda (Ballard) Ball, was born in Lowville, Lewis county, New York, August 6, 1819, and died in Plainfield, New Jersey, June 10, 1903. He received his early education in the public schools of Lewis county and the Lowville Academy, and then graduated from and prepared for the ministry at Oberlin University, Oberlin, Ohio. After this he spent his life as an ordained minister in active pastoral work in the Congregational church. He married Sarah A., daughter of Elisha and Resign (Clary) Curtis, who was born in Granville, New York, March 1, 1819, died September 21, 1888. Children: Irene Elizabeth, born in Oberlin, Ohio, July 2, 1845, died May 4, 1853; Franklin Harvey, born May 21, 1847, now living in Plainfield, New Jersey, married, February 24, 1868, Kate D. She received her education in the public schools of Grand Island and Buffalo, New York, and finally graduated from the Classical Union School at Clarence, New York. She married, at Grand Island, August 30, 1877, Franklin David, son of David Jonas and Rhoda (Brookfield) Wood, who was born at Dansville, New York, February 18, 1850. Both of his parents are descendants of old New Jersey families who have been identified for centuries with the history of Morris and Essex counties, New Jersey. Children: 1. (V) Dr. Henry N. Hess, son of John (2) and Lucetta (Minich) Hess, was born in New Maysville, Clarion county, Pennsylvania, July 13, 1854, and is now living in Fryburg, Pennsylvania. He received his early education in the public schools and in the academies at Corsica and West Millville, Pennsylvania, after graduating from which he taught school for seven years. He then entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons in Baltimore, Maryland, from which he graduated with his degree of Doctor of Medicine, March 1, 1882. He then settled in Fryburg, and on April 1, 1882, began the active practice of his profession, in which he still continues. He is a member of the Clarion County Medical Society, and is also a member of the Pennsylvania State Medical Society and of the American Medical Association. He has been a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows since 1884, and has also been a member of the Knights of the Maccabees for twenty years. He is a Lutheran in religion. He is a Democrat in politics, and was for six years one of the school directors of Fryburg, and in 1890 was elected a member of the Pennsylvania state legislature and reelected to the same office in 1892, and during his second term was an active member of

He received his early education in the public schools of Clarion county, and at the age of sixteen years entered the Western University at Pittsburgh, after graduating from which he entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Baltimore, Maryland, and graduated with his degree of Doctor of Medicine, June 1, 1905. He then spent one year as assistant resident physician in Bayview Hospital in Baltimore. He was then associated in practice with Dr. McElroy, at McKeesport, Pennsylvania, for a short time; practiced in Trafford, Pennsylvania, for about six months; then removed to Marysville, Forest county, Pennsylvania, where he remained for two years; in April, 1910, he returned to Fryburg and became associated in practice with his father, in which he still continues. The Ball family is supposed to be BALL of English origin, and tradition says the ancestor arrived in this country in 1635, locating in Boston, and from that point the family has spread over the country.

(I) The first member of this branch of the Ball family of whom there is definite information was Moses Ball, born and reared in the state of Connecticut, from whence he removed to New York while a young man. He married

(first) in New York state, Persilla Ball, (second) ———. Children of first wife: Elijah, Rufus, David, Sybil, Betsey, Susan, Abel, of whom further. Children of second wife: John and Almira.

(II) Abel, son of Moses and Persilla (Ball) Ball, was born in 1800, died October 19, 1853. He was educated in New York state, the place of his birth, and after reaching his legal majority he came to Warren, Pennsylvania, and afterwards located on a farm in Farmington township, Warren county. He was identified with agricultural and other pursuits during the greater part of his active career. He was a model of patience during a long period of six years, in which he was confined to his bed with the sickness which caused his death at the age of fifty-three years. He married Lucy Maria, born June 14, 1808, died December 26, 1897, daughter of Gideon Munson and Fanny (Fancher) Northrop. She came with her father to Warren county, Pennsylvania, when a child and spent the remainder of her life in this part of the state. Losing her husband at the time she did, the care of the family devolved upon her, and this trust she faithfully carried out with all the patience and devotion that only a good mother can accomplish. Mrs. Ball was a faithful member of the Methodist Episcopal church. Gideon Munson Northrop, father of Mrs. Abel Ball, was born in 1781, died August 28, 1848. He married Fanny, daughter of Ithiel and Mary (Hull) Fancher, and their children were: Lucy Maria, married Abel Ball; Harrison, born May 26, 1820, died August 7, 1825; Ithiel, born September 25, 1822, died August 11, 1825. The parents of Fanny Northrop, Ithiel and Mary (Hull) Fancher, had also two sons, Thomas and Ichabod Fancher. Gideon Munson Northrop was the son of Gideon and Esther (Munson) Northrop, the former of whom born in Amity Parish, November 1, 1753, died June 18, 1842, aged eighty-nine years; they were the parents of the following children: Eben, Isaac, Daniel, Merritt, Gideon Munson, mentioned above; Jesse,

David, Anna, Lucy, Hannah, Esther, Rebecca, Medad, Abner. The revolutionary record of Gideon Northrop is as follows: He enlisted the first part of May, 1775, as ensign under Samuel Osborne, in the parish of Amity, near Woodbridge, New Haven, Connecticut; served eight months. He enlisted, second, January 1, 1776, for one year under Captain Tuttle. He served consecutively under Lieutenant Catlin, Sergeant Orton, Sergeant Garnet, Colonel Charles Webb, of Pennsylvania, until the evacuation of Boston; thence to New London, and from there by ship to New York. He retired from New York with his troops, but was ill and returned to Hackensack, New Jersey. When recovered he rejoined his command, and was in the battle of White Plains, and also was employed in various services along the Hudson, until the expiration of his term, January 1, 1777.

(III) David Ithiel, son of Abel and Lucy Maria (Northrop) Ball, was born in Farmington township, Warren county, Pennsylvania, June 13, 1844. After completing the curriculum of the public schools of his native place, David I. Ball attended the Jamestown (New York) union school for a time and later completed a course of study in a collegiate institute in Jamestown. After leaving college Mr. Ball taught school in Warren county, Pennsylvania, for several terms. He decided upon the legal profession as his lifework and studied law under the able preceptorship of Judge Brown, of Warren county. He was admitted to the Pennsylvania bar in 1875 and initiated the active practice of his profession as junior member of the firm of Brown & Ball, with offices at Warren. This mutually agreeable partnership continued until 1880 when Mr. Brown was elected to a judgeship and forced to withdraw from active practice. Mr. Ball then associated himself with Hon. C. C. Thompson, and this co-partnership continued for several years.

Mr. Ball has gained distinctive prestige as a lawyer of note in this section of Pennsylvania, his practice extending over the courts of common pleas and in the United States courts. He is and has been a member of the State Bar Association for many years. He has been connected with over one hundred and thirty reported cases in the supreme and superior courts, some of which are among the most celebrated in the legal annals of the state. He was one of the attorneys in the famous

Ford and Lacy cases, which involved the partition of lands in Forest county and the ownership of valuable lands in Allegheny county, and which occupied the attention of the court for two years. He was also connected with the case of Commonwealth against Balph, who with others was charged with conspiracy growing out of the Ford and Lacy cases. The latter case attracted unusual attention, the question arising as to the power of the supreme court to remove criminal cases from the court of quarter sessions, the same power as is exercised by the court of the Kings Bench in England. Among the other notable cases in which Mr. Ball has figured prominently may be mentioned Tolles et al., which involved the validity of title to oil property; Babcock vs. Day; and the case of Warren Borough vs. Geer. For many years Mr. Ball was one of the administrators of the estate of L. A. Robertson, which was valued at two and a half millions. The great question in the latter case was as to the domicile of the testator, whether in New York or Pennsylvania. This question was finally settled by compromise, as being in the state of New York. Mr. Ball's bond as administrator was six hundred thousand dollars, in furnishing which he experienced no difficulty, so high does he stand in his profession and among his fellow citizens as a man of sterling integrity of character and fair and straightforward business methods. His life has been exemplary in all respects and is well worthy of commendation and emulation for along honorable lines he has won the success which crowns his efforts.

Mr. Ball's standing as a lawyer is one that does him credit and his ability has been demonstrated by the superior manner in which he has handled the litigation entrusted to his hands. The skill he displays in the management of his cases, the painstaking way in which he conducts his trials, and his integrity, combined with his fairness and undoubted honesty of purpose in all things, commands to him the esteem and confidence of the community, and has earned for him the popular approval of a large number of citizens of the state. He has succeeded in his profession and won a splendid reputation for himself.

In his political convictions Mr. Ball is aligned as a stalwart supporter of the Republican party, in the local councils of which he has long been an active factor. At the Republican state convention in 1912, Mr. Ball was

chosen as a presidential elector on the Republican ticket, from which he withdrew and was placed as an elector on the ticket which supported Roosevelt and Johnson in Pennsylvania, and with his colleague was elected at the state election. In 1871 he was honored by his fellow citizens with election to the office of treasurer of Warren county, and he served in that capacity with the utmost efficiency for one term. From 1893 he was a member of the school board of Warren for nine years, and for six years he was president of the board. He was chairman of the committee which had charge of the erection of the Warren high school, and two of the grammar schools, and he has ever manifested a deep and sincere interest in educational matters. In 1897 he was mentioned as one of the likely candidates for appointment to fill a vacancy which then existed upon the bench of the superior court. A large number of strong personal letters and petitions urging this appointment were presented to Governor Hastings in his behalf, but other influence was brought to bear and he did not receive the appointment. In his religious faith Mr. Ball is a zealous member of the Presbyterian church, in which he is an elder and was president of the board of trustees.

It is worthy of note here that Mr. Ball was a gallant and faithful soldier in the Union ranks during the civil war. In July, 1862, he enlisted for service in Company C Independent Pennsylvania Infantry, and subsequently he served in Battery H Independent Pennsylvania Light Artillery, which latter battery was stationed in Virginia during the threatened invasion of Washington by the Confederates. Mr. Ball retains a deep and abiding interest in his old comrades in arms and signifies the same by membership in Eben N. Ford Post, No. 336, Grand Army of the Republic, at Warren.

In 1871 Mr. Ball was united in marriage to Lucy Matilda, daughter of Elijah Robinson, of Farmington. They have one child, May, born August 4, 1872, married, June 24, 1909, Dr. William Charles DeForest, born September 10, 1873. Children: David Ball, born January 24, 1910; Lucy Ball, July 8, 1911.

Elijah Robinson, father of Mrs. David I. Ball, was born May 14, 1802, died March 5, 1882. He married Caroline (Northrop) Robinson, born August 7, 1811, died August 14, 1877. Children: Delilah, born February 11,

1831; Henry O., August 12, 1832; Emily, July 15, 1834; Solomon A., October 18, 1837; Daniel F., May 31, 1839, died September 14, 1862; Silas S., March 2, 1841, died January 18, 1863; Wellman J., August 20, 1843; Estar, July 4, 1845, died February 4, 1850; Lucy Matilda, June 23, 1847, married David I. Ball, mentioned above; Alzina A., March 6, 1850, died October 26, 1868; Zulema, August 10, 1853; Pathenia, November 6, 1856; Isalona, March 28, 1858, died December 24, 1911. Of the above Solomon A., Daniel F., Silas S. and Wellman J. Robinson enlisted in the volunteer service of the United States during the war of the rebellion. The former was wounded and Daniel F. and Silas S. died in the service.

Mrs. Lucy M. Ball has been active in charitable and religious work. During the earlier years of her married life she was one of the leaders of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in carrying on temperance work in Warren county, and was efficient in the work that secured the refusal in the county of licenses to sell intoxicating liquors. She was an active member of the Society of Christian Workers, and a member of its first board of directors, who established a Door of Hope, afterwards changed to The Home of the Friendless. This latter institution was changed into a hospital, to which was given the name of The Warren Emergency Hospital, and it thus became the beginning of the present finely equipped hospital by that name, managed entirely by a board of lady directors. This latter institution was incorporated on March 25, 1898, with Mrs. Ball as one of its charter members, and first board of directors, which position she continued to hold by successive elections until she resigned in December, 1910.

Among the deceased citizens of Pittsburgh whose lives and conduct were of such high value that all classes held them in honor and esteem, was the late Judge Frederick H. Collier. He was born at Millerstown, Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, February 25, 1826, and died October 29, 1906. He was the son of Rev. William Collier, D. D., born in Hagers-town, Maryland, May 11, 1803, who married Sarah Hill, daughter of Frederick H. and Margaret (Buckius) Hill, born in Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, January 2, 1798. By this union were born the following children: 1. Frederick H. 2. Charles W., born

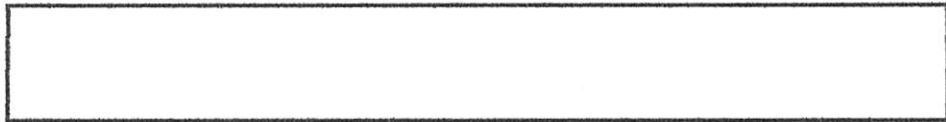
November 4, 1827, at Millintown, died aged twenty-one years, soon after he had graduated from Columbian College, Washington, District of Columbia, on board a ship from California to Central America. 3. Ann M. E., born October 26, 1836, at Alexandria, Virginia; married James Scott, of Steubenville, Ohio. 4. William S., born July 15, 1839, at Brookville, Maryland, died in Washington, D. C., in 1886.

William Collier Sr., the subject's grandfather, was born about 1773, in Berks county, Pennsylvania, and married Elizabeth ——. They were the parents of eight children: William, Daniel, Joseph, John, George, Mary, Elizabeth and Rebecca. John and George were in the civil war and George was killed in that conflict.

Joseph Collier, the great-grandfather and father of William Sr., married Miss Mary Marx, whose father and seven sons were in the revolutionary war and the most of them were killed in battle engagements. Joseph Collier and wife were the parents of three children: William Collier Sr., Daniel and Mary. The Colliers were of English descent, while the Marx family were from Germany originally.

Judge Frederick H. Collier, son of Rev. William Collier, was born February 25, 1826, and received his education at Brookville Academy, near Washington, D. C., graduating from Columbian College of Washington with the class of 1849. He then studied law, was admitted to the bar in the District of Columbia, and removed to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where he was admitted to the Allegheny county bar, January 11, 1851, on the motion of William M. Shinn. He was elected district attorney in 1856, served three years, and when the civil war came on he raised the One Hundred and Thirty-ninth Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, and was elected its colonel. He picked some of the flower of Pittsburgh families, who became members of Companies D, G and I, which companies were chiefly made up of Pittsburgh and Allegheny county men. The regiment was organized at Camp Howe, near Pittsburgh, September 1, 1862, when the government was still attempting to recover from the first Bull Run disaster. Judge Collier was elected colonel; James D. Owen, lieutenant-colonel, and W. H. Moody, major of the regiment. After being ordered to the front they received their arms at Harrisburg, and at once reported at Washington, where

 TO INCREASE THE PENSION OF WIDOWS, MINOR CHILDREN AND SO FORTH, OF DECEASED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS OF THE LATE CIVIL WAR, THE WAR WITH MEXICO, THE VARIOUS INDIAN WARS, AND SO FORTH, AND TO GRANT A PENSION TO CERTAIN WIDOWS OF THE DECEASED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS OF THE LATE CIVIL WAR.
 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That from and after the passage of this Act the rate of pension for widows, minor children under the age of sixteen years, and helpless minors as defined by existing laws, now on the roll or hereafter to be placed on the pension roll and entitled to receive a less rate than hereinafter provided, shall be twelve dollars per month; and nothing herein shall be construed to affect the existing allowance of two dollars per month for each child under the age of sixteen years and for each helpless child; and all Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed: *Provided, however,* That this Act shall not be so construed as to reduce any pension under any Act, public or private.
 SEC. 2.  SEC. 3. 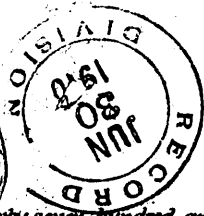
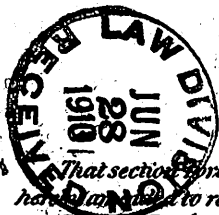

That section forty-seven hundred and forty-five, title fifty-seven of the Revised Statutes of the United States is hereby amended to read as follows.

Sec. 4745. Any pledge, mortgage, sale, assignment, or transfer of any right, claim, or interest in any pension which has been, or may hereafter be, granted, shall be void and of no effect, and any person who shall pledge or receive as a pledge, mortgage, sale, assignment or transfer of any right, claim, or interest in any pension or pension certificate, which has been, or may hereafter be granted or issued or who shall hold the same as collateral security for any debt, or promise, or upon any pretext of such security, or promise, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of the prosecution; and any person who shall retain the certificate of a pensioner and refuse to surrender the same upon the demand of the Commissioner of Pensions, or a United States pension agent, or any other person, authorized by the Commissioner of Pensions, or the pensioner, to receive the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of the prosecution.

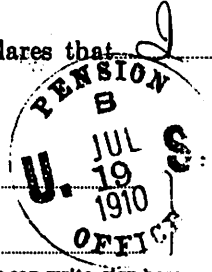

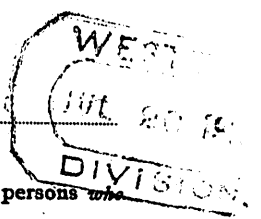

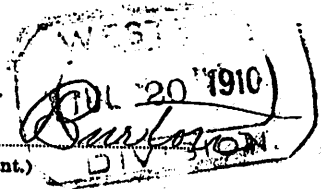
